Introduction

The Water Authority of Fiji (WAF) was established by the Government of Fiji in January 2010 to provide efficient and effective water and wastewater services to its customers and also setting up water supply systems in rural areas, giving access to water to Fijians to meet their daily needs.

The Government of Fiji started reforming the Water and Sewerage Department (WSD) in 2009. The objective of this reform was to enhance the sustainable delivery of water and wastewater services to appropriate levels of service. From January 1, 2010, WAF officially took over the responsibilities, functions, and operations previously carried out by WSD.

The Statement of Corporate Intent is a requirement pursuant to Section 22, of the WAF Act 2007. The Statement of Corporate Intent states the activities and intentions of WAF for 2022–2023, together with a summary of the objectives, outline of the activities, projects which will be delivered, financial and non-financial targets, accounting policies, main elements as contained in our Corporate Plan and performance measure for our Business, Corporate and Strategic Plans.

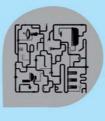

c) Conservation Responsibility

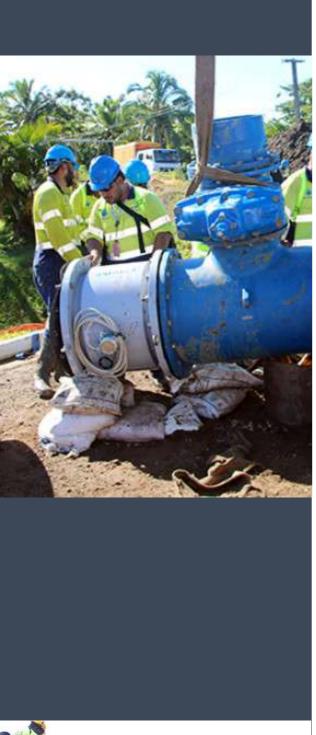
- Identify the level of water conservation to optimize future investments on behalf of our customers.

WAF's Executive Management Team consist of 8 members.



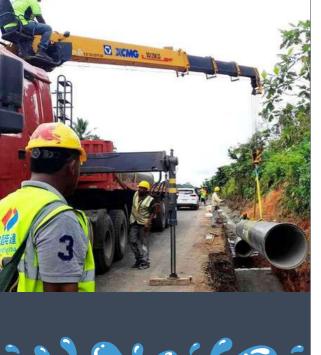
Budget

WAF received grants from Government for both our OPEX and CAPEX. The WAF approved budget for the 2022-2023 financial year is \$204,317,091 million (CAPEX \$115,100,000 million OPEX \$89,217,091 million). The new financial year is focused more on capacity building of WAF as a whole and resilient-building upgrades to our existing infrastructure that includes contingencies for the pandemic and natural disasters.

Climate Resilient

The challenges Fiji faces in the water and wastewater sector are enormous. Water sources are drying up due to prolonged dry spells and water treatment plants and pump stations are infiltrated with saltwater due to the rise in sea level. Heavy continuous rainfall contaminates raw water and causes flooding by damaging major raw water pipelines, wastewater treatment plants, pump stations, and manholes.

To address the above challenges, WAF is committing to integrated water resources management approach and is moving towards climate-resilient water and wastewater infrastructure in the future.

The total budget WAF received for FY 2022-2023 is \$204,317,091 (VIP), for capital expenditure \$115,100,000 (VIP) and \$89,217,091 (VIP) for operational expenditure.
