This Statement of Corporate Intent (SCI) sets out how WAF intends to fulfil its vision to be trusted by all Fijians for exceptional performance every day. WAF has implemented a holistic approach in order to support a sustainable water sector that is in accordance with WAF's strategic priorities capturing the eight (8) key focus areas. They are:

A major highlight for this financial year was the successful launching of the Water Sector Strategy 2050 (WSS2050) in April 2024. The event marked a pivotal moment for Fiji's commitment to ensuring sustainable & resilient water & sanitation services for its citizens over the next 3 decades. Furthermore, the Government's National Development Plan 2025-2029 and Vision 2050 was recently launched in September 2024 which aims to respond to the pressing global, regional and national challenges and enhance developments across various sectors in Fiji. Under the section 7.3 (Water and Wastewater) the NDP articulates uplifting social wellbeing and bringing sustainable prosperity to all Fijians by increasing access to clean water and sanitation for our citizens. The NDP elaborates on water and sanitation goals, policies, and planned strategies in order to improve the quality of access to water and sanitation services particularly in rural areas and intermittent water supply areas across the country.

The Fiji Government is committed to achieve a 24/7 provision of water and sanitation services. The Authority has been allocated a total budget of \$259.4 million. \$123.6 million for Operational Expenditure and \$135.8 million for Capital Expenditures.



This budget allocation is targeted towards the upgrading of WAF's existing water and sanitation infrastructures, to improve WAF's service sustainability through an efficient, safe and robust water supply system, improve sanitation to urban areas, increase service coverage, and to improve existing water & sanitation treatment capacity and process
